Life and Dignity of the Human Person

Our US Bishops draw upon the traditions of our Church's history that center us in who we are today as human persons and who we are to become. "The Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about the building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society." (USCCB document)



Over the next few weeks, we will be articulating some of these teachings that bring about a wisdom and desire to build a just society for all; from womb to tomb. This weekend we are speaking of issues from the beginning of life and an openness to life in all forms. The following weekend we will speak of some of the issues that are ongoing challenges for all of us as we respect others, such as racism, immigration, and disabilities. Finally, on October 31st, just in time for All Saints and All Souls Days, we will speak of our souls, death, and the fears that surround these issues of natural death, such as assisted suicide and the death penalty.

Beneath these issues and the theme to all of life are the Catholic Social Teachings. They center us on who we are to become in the kingdom of God; Life and Dignity of the Human Person and the Call to Family, Community, and Participation. My prayer is that if we can recognize and live these basic principles of faith and hope, then our lives will be in line with what Jesus is calling us to be as his disciples.

When we know that every person is precious and that people are more important than things, then we are gifted with a vision of life that brings hope to all we meet. Our mission here at Resurrection Parish is to bring this vision of hope and faith into all that we are and all we do. Our hospitality is primary to welcoming and supporting those in need within our community and to the ends of the earth. This gift and responsibility are what drives us to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our world today as we support the life and dignity of the human person.





Teach yourself and others to be grateful to God for the blessings He has given us.


This also teaches an overall sense of gratitude and a positive outlook on life, seeing the glass as half full, rather than half empty.

- Make it a practice, on a daily basis, to name something for which you are thankful, if you like to write, write a prayer of thanks to God.
- Write a thank-you letter to God, telling Him why His gifts are so special to them and what you will do with those gifts. This could be a good birthday or Christmas practice, when you or your family might be writing other thank-you notes, too.
- Read the Judgment of the Nations (Matthew 25:31-46). What are ways people are in need? How can you help?
- Think about, pray for, and take action to serve those in need.

RESPECT LIFE MONTH

During the month of October, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops asks parishes to highlight various Respect Life issues to broaden our awareness and strengthen our resolve in supporting systemic change in our efforts to recognize the worth and dignity of each and every life. The Gospels call us to place a special focus on those too often rejected by society, struggling on the margins.

CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME/LAUDATO SI

“LAUDATO SI’, mi’ Signore” – “Praise be to you, my Lord.” These are the words that open Pope Francis’ encyclical on ecology and care for God’s creation. These words, quoting St. Francis of Assisi’s beautiful canticle, remind us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us.

Pope Francis’ encyclical letter [*Laudato Si’*](#) was released in June 2015. Five years later, in 2020, Pope Francis invited all Catholics and people of good will to celebrate its fifth anniversary by protecting families and future generations through action to care for our common home. Here are themes that Pope Francis highlighted in *Laudato Si’* which require our urgent response today.

A Moral and Spiritual Challenge. The ecological crisis, Pope Francis writes, is a summons to profound interior conversion—to renew our relationships with God, one another, and the created world.

Care for God’s Creation. God created the world and entrusted it to us as a gift. Now we have the responsibility to care for and protect it and all people, who are part of creation. Protecting human dignity is strongly linked to care for creation.

We are All Connected. We are connected to the rest of the human family, to the created world, and to those who will come after us in future generations.

Impact on the Poor. People in poverty have contributed least to climate change, yet they are disproportionately impacted by it. As a result of excessive use of natural resource by wealthy nations, those who are poor experience pollution, lack of access to clean water, hunger, and more.

Called to Solidarity. We are one human family and have a shared responsibility for others and for creation. Wealthy countries have a responsibility to reduce consumption of non-renewable resources and should help poorer nations develop in sustainable ways.

Technological and economic development must serve human beings and enhance human dignity, instead of creating an economy of exclusion, so that all people have access to what is needed for authentic human development.

Supporting Life, Protecting Creation. Concern for nature is incompatible with failure to protect vulnerable human beings, such as unborn children, people with disabilities, or victims of human trafficking.

A Time to Act. Pope Francis calls for a change in lifestyle and consumption. We can make important changes as individuals, families, and communities, and as civil and political leaders.

Hope and Joy. “Injustice is not invincible” (no. 74) and we act knowing that we seek to live out God’s vision of renewed relationships with God, ourselves, one another, and creation.

How You Can Respond

All of us can take concrete steps – from reducing consumption in our homes, schools, workplaces, and communities — to advocating for changes in the marketplace and governmental policies designed to protect our environment for the generations yet to come.

Here are some ideas:

Become more aware of our connectedness. Care for one another and creation includes understanding that “everything is connected” (no. 91) and that the economy, politics, community involvement, and technology all affect the future of the planet and humankind. How can we become more aware of our connectedness?

Changes to lifestyle and consumption habits can make a big difference. For example, get a re-usable water bottle, give up plastic straws, take shorter showers, walk, bike or take public transportation instead of driving, recycle, compost food waste, & buy energy efficient appliances. How might you reduce the number of plastic bottles, cutlery, & bag use in your home, at work, at school, & in your recreational activities?

Make changes institutionally at your parish, school, or workplace. For example, start recycling and composting, use washable dinnerware in cafeterias, eliminate water served in plastic bottles, eliminate use of Styrofoam cups, share information electronically (*check out our parish options at <https://www.gbres.org/contactinfo>*) instead of printing, repurpose one sided printed paper “drafts” into notepaper, buy soap products in bulk and refill dispensers, do an energy audit, and install motion detector light switches and study the potential use of solar panels.

Support local efforts to solve environmental problems. Community groups around the country are working to make city, county, and state-wide changes that can make a big difference. Find out what is going on locally and get involved.

Contact your members of Congress to share Pope Francis’ message and urge action to address climate change.
